Target audience

- Native and non-native speaking teachers of all levels from primary to adult
- You will need at least an upper-intermediate level of English (B2)

Course summary

This course is designed to help you understand more about how your students learn. The course will bring you into contact with recent thinking and approaches to teaching related to Multiple Intelligences. During the course, you will become familiar with the different intelligences, learn how to recognise them in yourself and your students. It will enable you to be able to adapt the theory of Multiple Intelligence in the classroom. It will also deal with issues of assessment and evaluation. The course will also help you reflect on creating a successful climate for learning which, in turn, will enhance your own enjoyment of teaching. Materials will be created for the group by the main trainer, supplemented by published materials and by work presented by the participants themselves. This course also provide a large amount of English practice throughout.
